Important Dates for the Primary (Sep 10th)

I don't have a primary opponent, but I encourage everyone to get out and vote. I will be greeting people at at various polling locations on Sep 10th, so feel free to stop by and say hi!

You can start voting today! Up until September 9th, during regular business hours Monday-Friday, you can vote at your town hall. It's quick and there's usually no line.

Sep 10th: Vote at your polling location. Please note that polling locations for the primary may differ from the general election, because there are fewer polling places. Look up your polling place at vote.ri.gov

Important Dates for the General (Nov 5th)

October 6th: Deadline to register to vote. Register at vote.ri.gov

October 15th: Deadline to submit your mail ballot application to your local board of canvassers (inside your local town hall)

 Did you know you can now request a mail ballot online? You will need your driver's license number or State ID. Here is the link: https://mailballot.sos.ri.gov/

October 16th: Early voting starts at your town hall, during regular business hours Monday-Friday, up until Nov 4th

Nov 5th: Vote at your polling location. Look up your polling place at <u>vote.ri.gov</u>

Sheldon Whitehouse visited the Westerly Education Center

Thank you Senator Sheldon Whitehouse for visiting the Westerly Education Center. The original vision was to have "a community college" in Westerly, and the Education Center trains people on the skills that directly translate to local job opportunities (welding, electrical, biomanufacturing). Glad to support these CTE programs both here and in our local high schools

Governor McKee signed my ADU bill into law

Last week Governor Dan McKee signed mine and Rep June Speakman's ADU bill (enabling in-law units) into law. Homeowners can be a part of the solution to the housing crisis by converting a garage, basement or shed into an ADU and offering it as a long-term rental. Then they have the benefit of receiving some additional income or housing a loved one, friend or onsite caregiver.

DEM regulations requiring nitrogen-reducing septic upgrades (a technology that reduces nitrogen output by 66% on average), remain in place in the Salt Pond Management Area (a large portion of land south of Route 1).

Passed two Tech & Al resolutions at the National Conference of State Legislatures (NCSL)

Given my background in Computer Science and work experience in machine learning, I was appointed to the NCSL Technology & Communications Committee and named Vice-Chair.

This was my first year at NCSL, and I sponsored and passed two resolutions (see this link for full text of the resolutions)

- 1. Liability Insurance for Artificial Intelligence (AI) recommends developing liability insurance that takes into account each advanced AI technology's risks and safety measures
- 2. The Internet and Electronic Commerce updated the directive to include recommendations on youth privacy and youth mental health, and recommended that Congress take action on telemarketing and text scams

Why this matters? The resolutions that state legislators pass at this annual conference are listed under "Policies" (recommendations for federal policy) and they help direct NCSL's lobbying efforts to Congress.

Congressman Magaziner visited the Charlestown Breachway

Congressmen Seth Magaziner visited the Charlestown Breachway with myself, Tina Spears for State Representative, and town officials. It's not only commercial/recreational boaters who are having trouble navigating the channel; the ecosystem & aquaculture have changed as a result of the recent storm damage. While sandbags have been ruled out as a temporary fix, our Congress Members are working on an earmark to get ~\$5 million for the longer-term fix and we are working at the state level (DEM, Infrastructure Bank) to see what funding could be repurposed/loaned out, ahead of our next budget cycle.

Indian Tribe for their 349th annual pow-wow. I
met a few tribal council members and
Endawnis Spears (former Chariho school
committee candidate), and lots of community

Learned from other states at the National Caucus of Environmental Legislators (NCEL)

One of my favorite panels at NCEL is about wetlands. Did you know on average, one acre of wetlands stores one MILLION gallons of water? Because of that, they help mitigate flooding during storms. They also play a major role in cleaning our water and sequestering carbon. We have coastal wetlands in southern RI, and in the panel we learned about funding sources to protect wetlands (as a form of hazard mitigation). Bonus: we got to go kayaking!
